

delivery of activities will, in the future, be the Probation Services' main role in relation to ex-offenders outside prison. Many social enterprises should already be geared up to respond to this way of working. Certainly, hea from Matt Home at Willowdene Farm, his experiences demonstrated not only the benefits, but also the difficu

cultivating a strong partnership arrangement with commissioning bodies. The main point was that Willowden has maintained its ethos and services and it 'sells' these to Commissioners rather than being a social enterprise works for the Probation Service.

Another message from the Conference is that being flexible and able to adapt to the changing environment wil essential for social enterprises and this was made clear as the structural and organisational changes being visit upon Probation services were spelt out.

Firstly, many probation services will be put out to market and as such will be subject to increased competition. will be in a similar way to that affecting police services where, for example, G4S (formerly Group 4 Securitas) contract with the Lincolnshire Police Service.

West Midlands & Staffs Probation Trust is piloting a payment by results scheme which scraps multiple targets favour of one: reduced re-offending by any means or intervention. Again the contract to deliver this is likely to a large private sector provider, much as has happened with the Work Programme. But social enterprises, espe if they can form a strong delivery consortium, can play a major role in supporting these contracts. For example can bring innovation in service delivery and private sector organisations will be eager to look to partners that provide that innovative and creative approach that will deliver reduced rates of re-offending.

Another example given was Community Payback which has already been put out to national competition. Wes Midlands and Staffs Probation Trust is the prime bidder for community payback work in its catchment area. T intend to provide space for social enterprises to contribute to the delivery of these payback services e.g. throu supervision of out of hours work, or working with 'niche' offenders. So keeping engaged with Probation Trust monitoring the news on their websites will be important for social enterprises to keep track of opportunities.

At SEWM we will be hoping that we can utilise our national online directory <u>www.buyse.co.uk</u> to advertise ten opportunities over the coming months.

The contributions from those delivery organisations speaking at the event demonstrated how they had respon working in a rapidly changing environment. And in all cases they had remained focused on the client and their such as like Fry Housing with years of experience in working with and providing homes and support for ex-offer

Enabling interested organisations to tap into this pool of experience and knowledge is what SEWM has aimed achieve through the Conference and it was great to observe the enthusiasm of the speakers from Probation for stronger engagement with the social enterprise sector as well as the enthusiastic and informed discussion stim by the social enterprises.
